My name is James M. Cockrell, age 42 years and last May Friday and reside the Mills north of Carleton Ala.

To 2nd Interrogatory, he says that I only know G. J. Goodson personally during the Confederate War. I did not know him before or since said War

To 3rd Interrogatory witness answers I did know G. J. Goodson during the War, and I know that he did serve as a Soldier in the Confederate War. Because I served as a Soldier in the Confederate War with him, his name is on the original Company Roll, I have the original at my house.

To 4th Interrogatory the witness says that G. J. Goodson was a Soldier and performed the duties of such in Company "I". But just at the end of the War upon discharge papers were made out as Company "B" Regiment 7th Alabama Cavalry. I was in the same Company with the said G. J. Goodson

To 5th interrogatory witness refers to answer to 4th Interrogatory.

To 6th Interrogatory witness says that of his own

personal knowledge he cannot say, but he has reasons to believe he is one and the same man because he does not know, but one G. T. Goodson and has not seen him ^{since} they separated at Gadsden Alabama, in May 1865, but I have heard several of my friends say that he is now living in the State of Texas.

To 7th Interrogatory, Witness says,

I only knew G. T. Goodson during the War, and can not state about his habits, before or since the War, but during the War his habits were that usually to a Soldier.

To 8th Interrogatory, Witness says,

G. T. Goodson served more than three months as a Soldier, he did not desert his Command.

To 9th Interrogatory, Witness says,

I know nothing of the place of Residence of G. T. Goodson since the Confederate War, but he was present at the Battle of Perry 16th 1867.



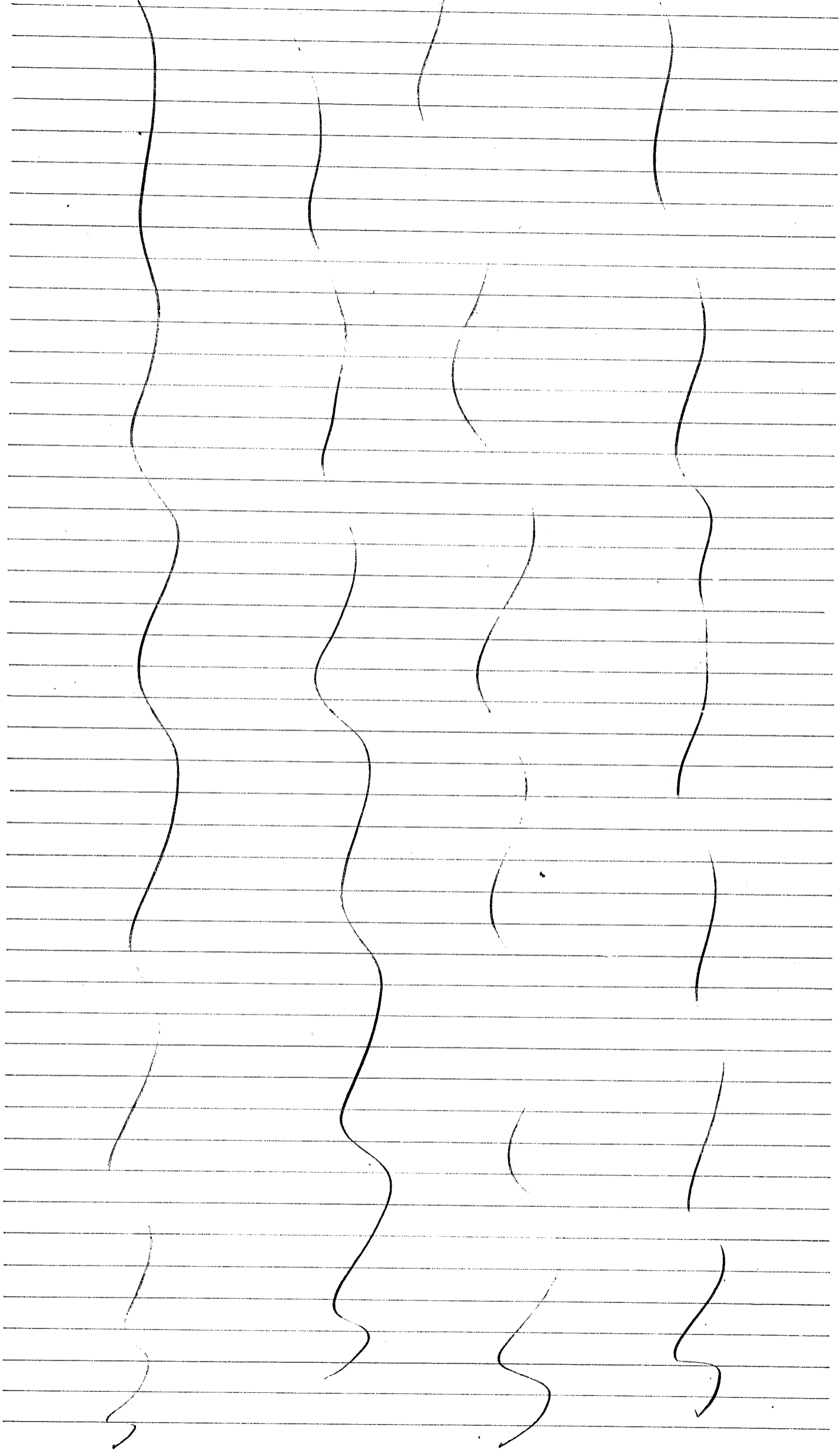

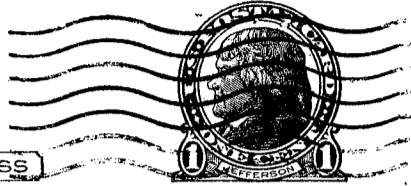

Goodson was a private in Company I, later known as Company C, 7th Alabama Regiment of Cavalry, Confederate States Army. The date of the enlistment and discharge of Mr. Goodson is not given. Dear Sir:

I acknowledge receipt of your letter of April 24 and wish to advise that your Mother would not be entitled to a burial fund since she was not a pensioner. In order to be eligible to a burial fund the soldier or widow must have been a Confederate Pensioner of this State.

I have examined the Confederate Pension roll of Texas and I do not find any record of George Hollingsworth or Dan Hollingsworth. It is possible that you can get their records by writing the Adjutant General, War Department, Washington, D. C. as all records are kept on file in that office. However, it will be necessary for you to give them some information as to the exact part of Texas in which they enlisted in the Confederate Army, and if possible, the names of the officers under whom they served or letter of Company and number of regiment in which they served.

I find that G. T. Goodson drew a Confederate Pension from the State of Texas under Pension File Number 14525. A witness who testified to Mr. G. T. Goodson's service stated that he was a private in Company C, 7th Regiment of Alabama Cavalry, Confederate States Army. The date of enlistment and discharge is not given. There were no records on file in the office of the Adjutant General, War Department, Washington, D. C. of the service of G. T. Goodson. Therefore, his application was approved on the affidavits of witnesses.

G. T. Goodson's death occurred on August 11, 1919.

As requested by you, I am returning the copy of the marriage certificate of George Hollingsworth and Miss N. E. Walker.
