THE STATE OF TEXAS }

I, Mrs Sarah Harrison, do hereby make application to the Commissioner of Pensions for a pension, to be granted me under the Act passed by the Thirty-first Legislature of the State of Texas, and approved March 26, A. D. 1909, on the following grounds:

I am the widow of Joseph H. Harrison, deceased, who departed this life on the 8th day of April, A. D. 1905, in the county of Cherokee, in the State of Miss

I have not remarried since the death of my said husband, and I do solemnly swear that I was never divorced from my said husband, and that I never voluntarily abandoned him during his life, but remained his true, faithful and lawful wife up to the date of his death. I was married to him on the 20 day of July, A. D. 1871, in the county of Freestone, in the State of Texas

My husband, the said J. H. Harrison, enlisted and served in the military service of the Confederate States during the war between the States of the United States, and that he did not desert the Confederate Service. I have been a resident of the State of Texas since prior to March 1, A. D. 1880, and have been continuously since a citizen of the State of Texas. I do further state that I do not receive from any source whatever money or other means of support amounting in value to the sum of one hundred and fifty dollars per annum, nor do I own in my own right, nor does any one hold in trust for my benefit or use, estate or property, either real, personal or mixed, either in fee or for life, of the assessed value of over one thousand dollars; nor do I receive any aid or pension from any other State, or from the United States, or from any other source, and I do further state that the answers given to the following questions are true:

1. What is your age? 58 years
2. Where were you born? In Fairfield Freestone County Texas
3. How long have you resided in the State of Texas? Since my birth
4. How long have you resided in the county of your present residence? And what is your postoffice address? About 20 years - Groveland Texas R. 1
5. What was your husband's full name? Joseph H. Harrison
6. What was the date of his death? April 8th, 1905
7. In what State was your husband's command originally organized? The State of Texas
8. How long did your husband serve? If known to you, give date of enlistment and discharge. He enlisted in the Spring of 1864 & served until the end of the war
9. What was the name or letter of the company, or name or number of the battalion, regiment or battery of artillery in which your husband served? If he was transferred from one branch of service to another, give time of transfer, description of command and time of service. He enlisted joining John Oliver Co. 1st Mamie's Regiment served during the time in South Texas in & near Galveston Texas.
10. Name branch of service in which your husband served, whether infantry, cavalry, artillery or the navy, or if commissioned as an officer by the President, his rank and line of duty, or if detailed for special service, under the law of conscription, the nature of such service, and time of service. My information is that my deceased husband was a private soldier - was not detailed in any special detail service - my information is that he enlisted in the Cavalry service in John C. Oliver's Co which I am informed was a Mamie's Reg.
11. Have you transferred to others any property of any kind for the purpose of becoming a beneficiary under this law? I have not

I have been informed and do so believe, that the deceased J. W. Harrison entered in the Confederate service in the Spring of 1864, in J. E. Oliver's Co. of Major's Regiment Cavalry and that he performed the duties of a soldier from the time he entered until the close of the war in 1865.

I have been informed and do so believe, that the deceased J. W. Harrison entered Company J. E. Oliver's Co. of Major's Regiment Cavalry and served in said Company from the Spring of 1864 to the end of the war, his principal place of service was in South Texas, near and around Galveston, Texas.

I have been informed and do so believe, that the deceased was a private.

A general statement

The deceased Soldier J. W. Harrison of said Major's Regiment after the war was my brother A. Anderson married the deceased sister before the war. I entered & joined the first Company from Co. W. L. Moody's Co. 4th Texas Infantry 1861. I received a discharge across the Mexico River & served in the Confederate Army.

and did not return to Texas on account of wounds received until in the Spring of 1866 and of course I was absent from Texas when deceased J. H. Harrison enlisted; but from family reports, correspondence general reunion, newspaper among his families from the deceased own statements to me I have no shadow of a doubt of deceased being in the Confederate army for the years 1864 & 1865.

To 3rd Int'y he answers: I knew Joe H. Harrison first in Freestone County Texas about 1855. and from that time to his death.

To 4th Int'y He answers.

Yes, I know that he enlisted from the fact that I saw Joe H. Harrison in actual service as a soldier in the Confederate army at Galveston Texas, about the close of the war. I was not a member of the Company to which he belonged, My information at the time, was that Joe H. Harrison belonged to Oliver's Co, *Mann's* Regiment. Cavalry, I was a member of Co, B. Bradleys Co. 2nd Bat. walls Legion. and stationed at Galveston at the time I saw Joe H. Harrison, in the service. I do not know what Co. Harrison belonged to, but understood that He was of Oliver's Co, *Mann's* Regiment

The foregoing is all that I personally know about the service of Joe H. Harrison. as a soldier in the Confederate Army.

The first time I remember seeing the deceased J. H. Harrison, was in the Spring of 1864. My father Col. J. B. Johnson at that time was serving, Commanding a Cavalry Regiment at Galveston. After we were ordered to come to Galveston the deceased J. H. Harrison then in City of Galveston, soon after we arrived at Galveston my father disbanded his Regiment John E. Oliver made up a Company of former disbanded soldiers a part of them at least - but deceased myself and others joined Oliver Co. "A" Mounted Regiment prior to this it was Bradford Regiment.

To 4<sup>th</sup> Interrogatory he answers

I do personally know that the deceased J. H. Harrison participated in the service of the Confederacy, and well performed the duties of a soldier.

To 5<sup>th</sup> direct Interrogatory he answers.

I personally know what Co. & Regiment the deceased J. H. Harrison joined & served in the Confederate army. He joined at Galveston John E. Oliver Co. 
