that I have been a bona fide citizen of this State since prior to January 1, A. D. 1880, and have been continuously since a citizen of the State of Texas. Later Mr. Perkins was with Christobal Benavides Cavalry command. I do not know he was with this last command of my personal knowledge, but I have talked to soldiers who were with him and they stated he served with them until close of war and made a good soldier.

Mr. Bird Neeson, who is now dead, told me personally that he served under Benavides with this regiment. From all I can ascertain he fought from 1862 until close of war, and a part of the time he was in my company.

J. P. Cotton was in Co D, 13 Texas Reismounted Cavalry and personally know that J. N. Perkins enlisted in Company C of my regiment and know he served through part of war in this Co. From hearsay I know that he later served under Christobal Benavides, and that he served from 1862 until close of war, and made a good soldier and never deserted.



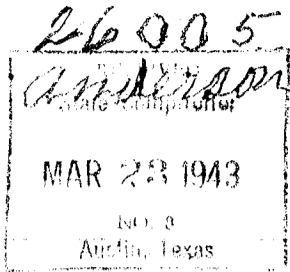
