To the 2nd. Int. He answers: *Yes I knew him from April 1861 to 9th April 1865, & some weeks thereafter have not seen him since he moved to Texas.*

To the 3rd. Int. he answers: *I first knew him at Charlotte Batts Va just prior to our Co. Charlotte Troop, after we met Co. D. 14th Va Cav. Co. S. Co., leaving for Richmond Va in May 1861. Pickles was mustered in Service 27 May 1861 at Asheville Va*

To the 4th. Int. he answers: *I personally know that Thos C Spencer enlisted into the Service of the Confederate Government & performed, well, the duties of a Soldier. He Served in Co. B. 14th Va Cav in Virginia in N. Va. under Brig Genl, A. G. Jenkins, Beal, John M. Claiborne, under Genl R. E. Lee - Except a blunder of that Service.*

To the 5th. Int he answers: *I have stated above that he Served in Co. B. 14th Va Cav C. S. Co., & when he was mustered into Service 27 May 1861, & Served until the Surrender of Genl R. E. Lee at Appomattox Co. April 1865*

To the 6th. Int. he answers: *He was a private in said Co., I do not remember that he was a non-commissioned officer. I may remember him as a private in said Co.*



To the 7th. Int. he answers: *I do not remember that he was ever detailed for any Special Service. So far as I remember he was in active Service in the field as a private Soldier.*

To the 1st. Cross Int. he answers:

I was a private in said Co when it was mustered in, then after 6 months made 1st Lt., after 12 mos made Captain & continued Capt till R. E. Lee's surrender, & during that all the time knew that C. S. Spencer personally & saw a great deal of him. There was no other man of that Co bearing his name, nor did I ever know any one else bearing that name & have no doubt that this applicant is the man.

To the 2nd. Cross Int. he answers:

As stated I have not seen that C. S. since he went to Texas but have corresponded with ^{him} and have the conclusive evidence that this applicant is the man who uses that name served in said Co under I with me.

To the 3rd. cross Int. he answers:

He did serve honorably from enlistment till the close of the War - 1861-5 in the Confederate Service, until he was discharged as a member of the Army of Northern Va, at Appomattox Va 9 April 1865.

To the 4th. cross Int. he answers:

Said that C. S. never denied his commission or voluntarily abandoned his post of duty in the Service during said War so far as I know or believe.

Historical Memorial of the Charlotte Cavalry.

The Charlotte Cavalry was organized in Charlotte County, Virginia, U. S. A., on the — day of —, —. On the 27th May, 1861, it was mustered into the service of the Southern Confederacy at Ashland, Va.

It served in the War 1861-5, first in Maj. George Jackson's Battalion, with one Company from Augusta County and two from Rockbridge County, Virginia, until September, 1862, when it was put into the 14th Virginia Cavalry as Company "B." This Regiment served under Brigadier-Generals A. G. Jenkins, Jno. McCausland and R. L. T. Beale, Major-General W. H. F. Lee's Division part of the time.

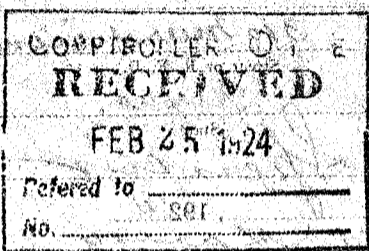
