I, Mrs. Mattie Frizzell, do hereby make application for a pension pursuant to the provisions of Articles 6204 to 6227, inclusive, of the Revised Civil Statutes of 1925 as amended by S. B. No. 27, passed by the Forty-first Legislature at its Fifth Called Session and all other laws of this State relating thereto.

I am a widow of Sam Wilson Frizzell deceased, who departed this life on the 11th day of Sept, A. D. 1911, in the county of Anderson, in the State of Texas

I have not remarried since the death of my said husband; (or in case of remarriage that I am now a widow); and I do solemnly swear that I was never divorced from my said husband Sam Wilson Frizzell

and that I never voluntarily abandoned him during his life but remained his true, faithful and lawful wife up to the date of his death. I was married to him on the 14th day of Oct A. D. 1867, in the county of Jackson in the State of Ill

My husband, the said Sam Wilson Frizzell, served as a Confederate soldier (or sailor) in the war between the States of the United States; or (that he was a soldier who, under special laws of the State of Texas during said war, served in organizations for the protection of the frontier against Indian raiders or Mexican marauders); or (that he was a soldier of the militia of the State of Texas who was in active service during said war.) That my said husband served honorably from the date of his enlistment until the close of the war, (or until he was discharged or paroled in some military organization regularly mustered into the army or navy of the Confederate States until the surrender). He was honorably discharged or paroled discharged at the end of war

MORTUARY WARRANT LAW

Article 6227 (R. C. S., 1925).—Whenever any pensioner who has been regularly placed upon the pension rolls under the provisions of law relating thereto, shall die and proof thereof shall be made to the Comptroller within forty days from the date of such death, by the affidavit of the doctor who attended the pensioner during the last illness, or the undertaker who conducted the funeral, or made arrangements therefor, the Comptroller shall issue a mortuary warrant for an amount not exceeding sixty-five dollars, payable out of the pension fund, in favor of the heirs or legal representatives of the deceased pensioner or in favor of the person or persons owning the accounts (proof of the existence and justice of such accounts to be made to said Comptroller under oath and in such form as he may require) for the purpose of paying the funeral expenses of the deceased pensioner. *In such cases where a warrant for the pension for the quarter during which the pensioner dies has been issued, the same shall be returned to the Comptroller, who shall mark the same "canceled" and file it before the mortuary warrant herein provided for shall issue. Where such warrant for the pension has not been issued, the same shall not be issued, but the mortuary warrant herein provided for shall take the place thereof.* (Acts 1923, p. 26.)

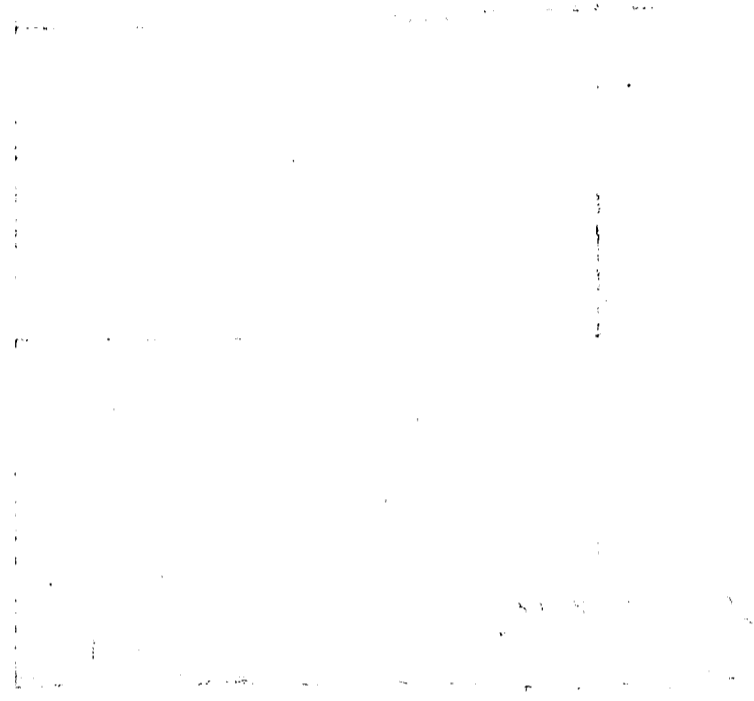

The records of this office show that Confederate pension warrants issued to Mrs. Mattie Frizzell of Frankston, Texas are being mailed to Frankston, Texas.

I have received a letter from Mrs. Frizzell and they show she has been in Washington, D. C. since September. I would like to know what sort of delivery is being made of these warrants. The law directs that where pensioners have died, removed, or remarried it shall be unlawful for the postmaster or other postal employees to deliver same to any person where delivery cannot be made to the pensioner, but they shall be returned to this office by the postmaster giving the reason why they could not be delivered to the pensioner. You will find this notice on the envelopes which contains pension warrants.

Dear Mrs. Frizzell:

Replying to your letter of December 12th, in which you request that a duplicate pension warrant be issued on your September pension payment.

You are advised that before a duplicate warrant can be issued it will be necessary that you file a bond with the State of Texas in double the amount of the warrant. If this bond is properly executed and filed with this office and same is approved, a duplicate warrant will issue.

It appears from your letter that you have been in Washington D. C. for sometime. I note your pension warrants are being mailed to Frankston, Texas. I would like to know just how these warrants are reaching you as the requirement of the law is that if pensioners are out of Texas, pension warrants shall be returned to this office by the postmaster.

The law further requires that postmasters shall not forward or deliver these warrants to other parties.

Please furnish me the above information and also the exact date you left Texas.

No further pension warrants can be issued to you until I have received the exact date on which you left Texas, and until you furnish your address where warrants can be delivered to you in person.
