THE STATE OF TEXAS

County of Anderson -

I, Thomas H. Hulan, do hereby make application to the Commissioner of Pensions for a pension to be granted me under the Act passed by the 33rd Legislature of the State of Texas, and approved April 7, 1913, on the following grounds:

I enlisted and served in the military service of the Confederate States during the war between the States of the United States, and that I did not desert the Confederate service, but during said war I was loyal and true to my duty, and never at any time voluntarily abandoned my post of duty in the said service; or that I was in the service of the State of Texas during the war, to protect said State against the Indians and Mexicans for more than 6 months.

That I was honorably discharged or surrendered I surrendered at Vicksburg, Miss. at close of Civil War between the States, in 1865 -

that I have been a bona fide citizen of this State since prior to January 1, A. D. 1900, and have been continuously since a citizen of the State of Texas. I do further state that I do not hold any National, State, city or county office which pays me a salary or fees of \$300.00 per annum, nor have I an income from any other employment or other source whatever which amounts to \$300.00 per annum, nor do I receive from any source whatever money or other means of support amounting in value to the sum of \$300.00 per annum, nor do I own in my own right, nor does any one hold in trust for my benefit or use, nor does my wife own, nor does any one hold in trust for my wife, estate or property, either real, personal or mixed, either in fee or for life, of the assessed value of over one thousand dollars, exclusive of a home of the value of not more than \$1000.00; nor do I receive any aid or pension from any other State, or from the United States, or from any other source, and that I am not an inmate of the Confederate Home, and I do further state that the answers given to the following questions are true:

1. What is your age? 70 years old.
2. Where were you born? Hardin County, Tennessee.
3. How long have you resided in Texas? Since 1898 continuously.
4. In what county do you reside? Anderson County
5. How long have you resided in said county and what is your postoffice address? Since 1898 continuously; P.O. address: S Locum, Texas

6. Have you applied for a pension under the Confederate pension law and been rejected? If rejected, state when and where Never applied before.

7. What is your occupation, if able to engage in one? Notable to do anything. I was a sharpshooter.

8. In what State was the command in which you served organized? and our battalion was drawn from every command in the South.

9. How long did you serve? Give, if possible, the date of enlistment and discharge enlisted in May 1861 - and served until close of war.

10. What was the letter of your company, number of battalion, regiment or battery? Company C - Rapley's Sharpshooters -



11. If transferred from one command to another, give time of transfer, name of command and time of service I enlisted in the 20th Arkansas Regiment, but within 2 months I was transferred to the Sharpshooters as above stated and served with the Sharpshooters the rest of the war.

12. What branch of the service did you enlist in—infantry, cavalry, artillery or navy? Infantry Sharpshooters

I am 70 years old, deaf and crippled, and unable to do any work.

13. If commissioned direct by the President, what was your rank and line of duty? Private.

14. If detailed for special service, under the law of conscription, what was the nature of your service and how long did you serve? Never detailed - A Volunteer

I own 2 horses and 3 cattle, worth \$300.00 - no other property of any description - no land.

15. Have you transferred to others any property of any kind for the purpose of becoming a beneficiary under this law? No -

Wherefore your petitioner prays that his application for pension be approved and such other proceedings be had in the premises as are required by law.

ing facts touching the applicant's service in the Confederate Army: (State fully your source of knowledge.)

I, J. A. Lackland, was a member of Company A, 10th Arkansas Cavalry, and was not in the same Company with Mr. Hulan; however we were both from the same section of Arkansas; Mr. Hulan and I, lived about five miles apart at the time the war broke out, and I knew him well. We both enlisted and fought for the Confederacy; though not in the same Company, our division was often thrown together, and I saw him many times throughout the war, and fought battles with him. He enlisted in the Spring of 1862, and served until the close of the war; I never heard of anything against him, and from all reports he made a good soldier; he served until the close of the war; being from the same neighborhood I often sought him out, and found him on duty in the Confederacy, attending to the duties of his position. He was with the Sharpshooters, Rapley's Battalion. I have known Mr. Hulan since the war, and know that he is the same man who is now making this application;

I, J. A. Lackland, also was well acquainted with Steve T. Bright, one of Mr. Hulan's witnesses, and Mr. Bright now lives in Arkansas; he was also in the Civil War, and is a credible citizen, and trustworthy and worthy of belief.

I know that he was in a number of battles, among which I will name the following: Jenkin's Ferry, Corinth, Baker's Creek, and the Siege of Vicksburg.

Bright, known to be to be a credible person, and known to me to be worthy of belief and a respectable citizen, and who after being duly sworn, on oath deposes and swears that he knows Tom H. Hulan, who now resides at Slocum, in Anderson County, Texas, who is an applicant for a Confederate Pension under the laws of the State of Texas; that Tom H. Hulan is an old Comrade of this affiant; that this affiant and Tom H. Hulan fought through the Civil War together; that they were together in many important battles, among them being the Battles of Corinth, and Vicksburg, and others; that they were in the 12th Batallion of Sharpshooters together, also called Company C, Rapley's Sharpshooters; that this affiant knew Tom H. Hulan to be a good soldier; that he never deserted, and never voluntarily abandoned his post of duty ; that he was a Volunteer, and not a Conscript; that we fought side by side for some three years; that he was with me throughout the war, and my knowledge is derived from personal association with him during the war; I knew of no other man by this name in the war; our duties were hard, on account of being with the sharpshooters, but Mr. Hulan never flinched, and went about his duties as a soldier should. He surrendered at the close of the war, and went back to farming, trying to build up the battle worn South.

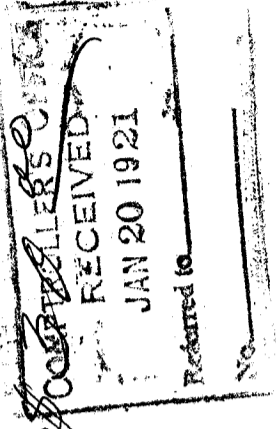

You will find from the application that I secured three witnesses as to his service in the army, which is one more than the law seems to require. I know Mr. Hulan personally, and know his Sons. His family is respected by all who know them. Mr. Hulan is getting old, and cant work. He is deaf and all crippled up, and is badly in need of a pension, and I join in asking that the application be granted. All of his relatives are poor, and not able to help him, and hence a pension would be a great deal of help to him.

The records of this office show T. H. Hulam, also shown as Thomas H. Hulam, filed application for Confederate Pension in September, 1913 at which time he stated he was 70 years old - born in Hardin County, Tennessee. He had resided in Texas since 1898.

The application for pension was approved under Pension File No. 24028 and he drew a pension until his death in December, 1920.

Mr. Hulam stated he enlisted in the 20th Arkansas Regiment in 1861 but within 2 months he was transferred to the Sharpshooters or Company G, Ripley's Sharpshooters, Infantry, C. S. A. He served in this organization until the close of the war in 1865. He was surrendered at Vicksburg, Miss. at the close of the war.

The application for pension was approved on the affidavits of witnesses.

No further information of the service of Mr. Hulam is given.
